We Entertain

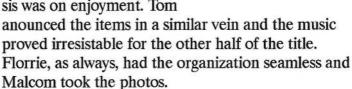
We always receive a warm welcome when we perform at Margaretholme and although through a variety of

On Thursday we joined in the RSCDS New York Branch class and on Monday The Scotia Dancers class, both held in Manhattan. I had first danced with the New York Branch when attending their annual weekend school at Pawling and whenever I'm there I try to attend their class. It is always good to see my friends there. On Saturday evening we went to the 25th Anniversary Dinner and Ball of the RSCDS New Jersey Branch. There were about a

hundred dancers and the six-piece band included three fiddlers! There was great music, a nice programme and a very good atmosphere. It was altogether a very enjoyable evening.

A special event while we were in New York was The Tartan Day Parade on the Saturday. Tartan Day has been held for some years, but this was undoubtedly the biggest ever. For two and a half hours nearly ten thousand pipers and drummers marched along 6th Avenue. At the head of the parade were actor Sir Sean Connery and the Mayor of New York.



Most of the bands were from the USA and Canada, but there were even some Scots pipe bands that came over especially for the occasion. It was a spectacular event.

Sunday afternoon we went to a party organised by the Caledonian Society of New York with as guests the Edinburgh Postal Pipe Band. Cathy enjoyed both the parade and the party and knows already what she is going to be: a piper!

TOP TEN THINGS THAT MAKE A GOOD DANCER

- is always on time for the next figure by dancing with the music, on the beat, and with the proper phrase.
- 2. moves smoothly through the figures and helps their partner phrase with them.
- 3. gives eye contact with all dancers in the set. "If you feel like it, flirt with people you meet; its fun and non-fattening."
- 4. is considerate and supportive; does not physically force other dancers, gives firm arms and a handshake hold (modified as necessary).
- is courteous; listens quietly to teaching or briefing and follows instruction; lets the teacher sort out problems the dancers may have.
- 6. can dance the opposite part; will fill in sets on either side as necessary.
- dances equally well as a supporting member of the set (i.e. 1st or 2nd corner), knowing when and where to join the next figure.
- 8. anticipates the next figure and executes transitions smoothly.
- can recover if the set breaks down; knows to skip a figure and when and where to pick up the next, with the musical cue.
- avoids reckless movement, fancy spins and twirls; dances in their own space, not intruding on another dancer or into another set.

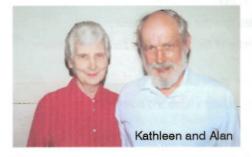
